Head Start factsheet for parents/caregivers

About Head Start

Head Start provides support to students in Victorian government schools to undertake a school-based apprenticeship or traineeship, otherwise known as an 'SBAT'.

School-based apprenticeships and traineeships

School-based apprenticeships and traineeships (SBATs) are an employment-based learning pathway that allow students to combine their senior school years with paid part-time employment and skills training in a preferred industry.

Eligibility

SBATs are available to secondary school students who are:

- enrolled in years 10, 11 or 12
- at least 15 years of age
- an Australian citizen or permanent resident*
- *Non-citizens may be eligible under certain circumstances. Speak with the Head Start coordinator for more information.

Benefits of Head Start support

Head Start supports SBATs to:

- increase their future employability and earning potential by gaining the skills, confidence and knowledge they need to succeed in the workplace
- undertake a secondary school certificate such as the VCE, VCE Vocational Major, or the Victorian Pathways Certificate (VPC)
- · undertake paid employment to build the career they want
- access quality Vocational Education Training (VET) courses in a wide range of industries with an approved training provider.

SBAT readiness

Students may complete the Language, Literacy and Numeracy (LLN) via an online platform that assesses their language, literacy and numeracy skills. The LLN will help Head Start staff to determine student's readiness for vocational learning opportunities and what supports are to be provided to assist the young person to be successful in a School Based Apprenticeship or Traineeship.

Getting started with Head Start

- Students participate in career planning: the school career adviser helps them to explore their career options and connects them with a Head Start coordinator to provide further information and a referral form for your consent.
- Parents/Caregivers consent to an interview: Complete and return a paper or digital consent form, so that Head Start can contact you to set up an interview with you, your young person and a Head Start Coordinator.
- 3. Attend an interview: Head Start will set up an interview between you, your young person and a Head Start coordinator to discuss program details and expectations.
- Identify an opportunity: the Head Start coordinator works with each student to match their skills and interests to the right opportunity with the right employer.
- Have a go: Students complete work experience or structured workplace learning to make sure that the workplace is the right fit.
- Establish the SBAT: the Head Start coordinator works with your young person, the school, employer and you to set up the SBAT.
- Get started: the Head Start coordinator works with school staff to create a flexible timetable that helps your young person to successfully combine school, work and training. Students receive one-on-one support during their SBAT and when transitioning to a full or part-time apprenticeship or traineeship upon completion of school.

BSSC Key Dates for Late 2024 and Start of 2025

Dear 2025 BSSC Parents, Carers and Students

As you will all be aware, the college is running our two-week Step Up program commencing Monday, November 25 and concluding on Friday, December 6.

During these two weeks, we will be running our 2025 timetable and students will be commencing next year's classes. These classes are an important step towards a successful start to your Year 11 or Year 12 program and attendance is compulsory.

Our Ready to Learn interviews are an important part of preparation for 2025. At these interviews students and parents/carers meet with their 2025 Advisor to discuss the year ahead and share important information.

In the past, we have held Ready to Learn interviews in late January but based on parent and student feedback we've decided to run these from November 20-22 in place of our planned orientation activities.

You will be able to book your 30-minute Ready to Learn interview for the afternoon/evening of Wednesday, November 20 or any time during school hours on Thursday, November 21 or Friday November 22. Current Year 10 students should schedule their booking around other commitments they have on those days, including Year 10 exams and graduation events.

You will be emailed advice on November 14 about how book your Ready to Learn interview. I strongly encourage you to book early.

LONG-TERM LOAN COMPUTERS

As part of being ready-to-learn, it is a requirement that students bring a charged laptop to school each day. The College has assisted families in doing this by providing Long-Term Loan Computers to many pupils. Students and parents/guardian with College devices need to ensure that they:

· Are adhering to the User Agreement, as signed by parents and students.

• Are charging their laptops at home. No student, for a variety of Occupational Health and Safety reasons, are permitted to charge their computers on site. Both the GLC and IT have the capacity to charge student devices for them.

- · Keeping the computer, while not being used, in a locked locker.
- · Are not loaning their device to other people.
- · Report any damage/malfunction/loss of device to IT or the GLC immediately.

· Are not borrowing additional school computers from the GLC, 3 or more times. Doing this will result in the College requesting the device back.

Important Dates:

· Year 10 students will need to return their Long-Term Loan computer, and its charger, no later than 11th of November.

· Year 7-9 students will need to return their Long-Term Loan computer and its charger, no later than 2nd of December.

Safe to school How to drop off and pick up children safely





Supervise children in or near traffic.

The best way for children to learn to be safe on the roads is under your guidance, in real traffic, in everyday situations. Until children are about 10 or 11 years of age they do not have the necessary skills and physical abilities to be safe on their own so providing supervised practice is important.

Walk or cycle to school with your child.

Take the healthy option. If you can't walk the whole way, consider parking a few streets away and walking the rest of the way. Children under the age of 12 are allowed to ride on footpaths and so can adults riding with them.

Respect the road rules and parking signs.

It is important that parents park legally to provide a safer environment for children.

- Double parking restricts the view of drivers, forces children onto the road and obstructs the flow of traffic.
- Parking within 20 metres before a designated school crossing or 10 metres after is illegal.

Wait on the same side of the road as your child.

- Meet your child at the school gate to avoid your child dashing across the road.
- If picking up your child from the bus stop, wait on the same side as the bus.

If you need to drive to school, get your child into the habit of using the car's kerbside doors and ensure your child is using a booster seat or correctly adjusted seatbelt.

The safest doors are kerbside doors, away from traffic. For information about Victoria's child restraint road rules, visit vicroads.vic.gov.au/ChildRestraints

Participate in the development of a safe drop off and pick up strategy for your school. Raise this issue with your school council and participate in the development of a 'safe to school' strategy. Visit vicroads.vic.gov.au/safetoschool for more information.






Obey these signs



40km/h sign

All school speed limits across the State are clearly signposted. Look out for the speed signs near schools and slow down to improve safety for children.



Children crossing

When the flags are displayed at a children's crossing, you must stop for pedestrians who are waiting to cross or who have started crossing. You must remain stopped until the crossing is clear. These rules apply even if there is no crossing supervisor.



No parking

If there is a 'no parking' sign, you can stop for 2 minutes in that area:

- if you are picking up or dropping off passengers or goods
- you stay within 3 metres of your vehicle.



No stopping

No stopping means you must not stop at the kerb for any reason.



Bus zone

Take extra care and be on the lookout near school bus stops as children may be trying to cross the road nearby.
